

# "C2C" - Dishcloth

#### **Materials:**

- Crochet Hook C (2.75mm)
- Rainbow Cotton 8/4 (50 g)

#### Gauge:

Approx. 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  squares x 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  squares = 4" x 4"

Finished Measurements: Approx.  $10^{\prime\prime}$  x  $10^{\prime\prime}$  Size can be adjusted by adding more rows in the pattern

### **Abbreviations:**

ch: chain

st: stitch

sl st: slip stitch

dc: double crochet



## **About the pattern:**

"C2C" – Corner to corner is worked using ch sts, dcs and sl sts. As the name describes, the pattern is worked from diagonally from one corner to the other.

"C2C" is made up of small squares. There is a new square added on each row, so the work will grow evenly. The same is true in the decrease section- there will be 1 square less on each row.

## **Pattern and Photo Tutorial:**

## **Increasing**

1. Ch 6. In the  $4^{th}$  ch from the hook, work 1 dc. Work 1 dc in the last 2 ch sts. There is now 1 "square".








2. Turn work and Ch 6. In the 4th ch from the hook, work 1 dc. Work 1 dc in the next 2 ch sts. Sl st in the left corner of the first "square" on the first work. You have now added 1 "square".







Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc). Work 3 dc in the same space that you made the sl st and ch. This creates 1 "square" and now you have 2 squares on this row.





3. Ch 6 and turn. In the 4th ch from the hook, work 1 dc. Dc in the next 2 ch sts. Sl st in the left corner of the 1st "square" on the previous row. You have now added 1 square.















Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc). Work 3 dc in the same space that you made the sl st and ch. Sl st in the left corner of the  $2^{nd}$  "square" on the previous row. There are now 2 "squares" on this row.











Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc). Work 3 dc in the same space that you made the sl st and ch. There is now 1 more "square" making a total of 3 squares on this row.





Repeat this pattern until there are 21 squares on a row or until you reach the desired size.






## **Decreasing:**

Now that the washcloth is as wide as you would like, you will begin decreasing on each side so the work becomes square.

1. Turn your work. Sl st along the side of the first "square". Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc). Work 3 dc. Sl st into the top right corner of the next "square".





Work the row as before until you reach the last "square".



When you get to the last "square" of the row, end with a sl st in the top right corner of the next square. Now the row has decreased by 1 square.










1. Turn you work. SI st along the edge of the first "square". Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc). Work 3 dc. SI st in the top right corner of the next "square".





Work the row as before until you reach the last "square".



When you get to the last "square" of the row, end with a sl st in the top right corner of the next square. Now the row has decreased by 1 square.



Repeat the decreasing rows until you have 1 square left.

Turn work and sl st along the edge of the last square to the corner. Cut yarn and weave in the ends.











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
