Bambus and environment - Bamboo is the fastest growing plant in the world and thus a great source of sustainable production.
Bamboo releases more oxygen than any other plant and grows without the use of pesticides. $23 \%$ cotton and $7 \%$ acrylic help to stabiliz bamboo and give the thread a good shape retention. Machine washood $70 \%$ Bamboo/23\% Cotton/7\% Acrylic,

## Notes for the pattern:

Traditional knitting without twisting the yarn in the back is recommended.

Be sure to adhere to the gauge in the patterned part as well.
If the gauge is not respected, the sweater will be either larger or smaller.

## LITTLE ONE'S \& TWEENS

Sizes: 1-2 years ( $3-4$ years) $5-6$ years (7-8 years) $9-10$ years (11-12 years)

## FRONT AND BACK

Begin at the bottom of the sweater.
Cast on 160 (180) 190 (202) 214 (224) sts
on $2,5 \mathrm{~mm} \mathrm{~N}$.
Knit ribbing in the round: $\mathrm{kl}, \mathrm{pl}$

- for 12 (12) 14 (14) 16 (16) r.

Switch to $3,0 \mathrm{~mm} N$ and insert $M$ at the beginning and after 80 (90) 95 (101) 107 (112) sts.
Knit stockinette st until the work measures 20 (24) 27 (31) 34 (34) cm incl. ribbing (or the desired length, which is adjusted before the armhole).

For the armhole, bind off $5(5) 6(6) 6(6)$ sts on each side of the $M$

- in total 140 (160) 166 (178) $190(200)$ sts.

Set the work aside.

## SLEEVES

Cast on 44 (44) 46 (48) 50 (52) sts on $2,5 \mathrm{~mm}$ N.
Knit ribbing in the round: $\mathrm{kl}, \mathrm{pl}$

- for 12 (12) 14 (14) 16 (16) r.


## Switch to $3,0 \mathrm{~mm}$ N.

Continue with stockinette st with increases for armhole. Insert a $M$ at the beginning of the round.
Increase as follows: kl , pick up 1 st from the front through the previous row and ktbl, knit until 1 st is left, pick up 1 st through the previous row on the back and $\mathrm{k}, \mathrm{k}$.
Increase every 8th r, 8 (9) 10 (12) 13 (15) times

- until a total of $60(62) 66(72) 76(82)$ sts.

Knit until sleeve measures 20 (24) 26 (29) 32 (35) cm incl. ribbing (or the desired length, which is adjusted here - note that for shorter sleeves, the increases must be adjusted as well).

Finish by binding off $5(5) 6(6) 6(6)$ sts each side of $M$ - in total $50(52) 54(60) 64(70)$ sts.
Set the work aside.
Knit the second sleeve.

## CHART

Assemble the parts on $3,0 \mathrm{~mm} \mathrm{~N}$.
For 240 (264) 274 (298) 318 (340) sts.
Round/chart begins between back and left sleeve (it is recommended to begin at the back of the sweater where the transition will not be seen so easily). Knit in the round, decreasing as per the chart, evenly throughout the round.
Do not decrease over the sleeves during the first row - it gives more space over the arm and a better fit.

## Size 1-2 years:

in section $1+4+5$ knit 2 N Basic,
in section $2+3$ knit 3 N Basic.

## Size 3-4, 5-6 and 7-8 years:

in section 4 knit 2 N Basic,
in section $1+2+3+5$ knit 3 N Basic.
Size 9-10 years:
in section $1+2+3+4+5$ knit 4 N Basic.

## Size 11-12 years:

in section $1+2+3+4+5$ knit 5 N Basic.

When decreasing in the sections, place the decreases in the centre of the section, evenly throughout the round.
Make the decreases in the pattern part as indicated by the red lines, evenly throughout the round. The neckline is made in the last round, before the last decreases on the chart.

## NECK

The neck can be made in two ways:

## 1. the neckline is higher in the back (worked with short rows).

Place a $M$ in the centre of the front piece (if uneven number of sts, into the centre st) to mark the starting point for the neck.

The neck with higher neck is formed by short rows as follows:
k until 12 (12) 12 (16) 16 (16) sts before the $M$, turn the work, wrap yarn around the N , p until 12 (12) 12 (16) 16 (16) sts before the $M$, turn the work, wrap yarn around the N .

BEWARE: Always knit the yo (yarn over) together with the neighbouring st to prevent holes in the work - for the nicest results, always p2tog tbl on the "wrong side" and on the front, k2tog tbl.

K until 9 (9) 9 (13) 13 (13) sts before the $M$, turn the work, wrap the yarn around the N , puntil 9 (9) 9 (13) 13 (13) sts before the $M$, turn the work, wrap the yarn around the N .

K until 6 (6) $6(10) 10(10)$ sts before the $M$, turn the work, wrap the yarn around the N , puntil 6 (6) 6 (10) $10(10)$ sts before the $M$,
turn the work, wrap the yarn around the N , $k$ to the beginning of the round.

Number of sts on the N before the last decreasing: 117 (135) 144 (153) 153 (162) sts.
2. either the same height for front and back.

Knit without short rows (turn knit).

## NECKLINE

Switch to $2,5 \mathrm{~mm} \mathrm{~N}$.
Knit in the round k1, pl - for 20 (20) 24 (24) 28 (28) r. Bind of loosely in rib st.
In case the bind off seems to be too tight, this last row can be worked with a larger $N$

## ASSEMBLY

Fold half of the neckline towards the "wrong side" and sew loosely all around.
Sew together under the sleeves.
Weave in the ends.


Please note that the chart has separate subdivisions for the 3 sizes.

There are different numbers of $r$ in the sections depending on the size.

Size 1-2 years: in section $1+4+5$ knit 2 N Basic, in section $2+3$ knit 3 N Basic.

Size 3-4 and 5-6 years: in section 4 knit 2 N Basic, in section $1+2$ $+3+5$ knit 3 N Basic.

## Decreasing

When decreasing in the sections, place the decreases in the centre of the section, evenly throughout the round.
Make the decreases in the pattern part as indicated by the red lines, evenly throughout the round.

## Neckline

The neckline is made in the last round, before the last decreases on the chart.

## Good to know

Needle Size + Tension
Knitters knit very differently: some knit with a needle size $2,0 \mathrm{~mm}$ and obtain the same size of design quality as a person who knits with a needle size $4,0 \mathrm{~mm}$. We owe this knowledge to the team of knitters who join us. The key to knit a specific size is a lot about the kniting style/hands/skills, rather than the size of needles.
Therefore, we will recommend a range of needle sizes.
