CHILLY - POM SCARF

Extra-long scarf with playful poms on the end



When the chill of fall is in the air, but it's not cool enough for a jacket, reach for the Chilly Pom Scarf. This extra-long rectangle scarf gets a dose of flair from some geometric color placement and cute little pom poms placed on the ends. It's the ultimate accessory to show your personality – build a color palette that's uniquely you, adjust the size and color placement of your pom poms, the customization options are endless!

The Chilly Pom Scarf is part of the Happy Place pattern collection, designed to complement Happy Place Yarn. Find even more patterns and get the yarn needed for this project from Hobbii's website.

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PROJECT SUPPLIES

YARN: Hobbii Happy Place, DK weight (#3); 50% wool, 50% cotton [273 yards (250 m) per 100g skein].

- A 09 Solid, 155 yards/142 m (1 skein)
- B 01 Melange, 155 yards/142 m (1 skein)
- C 19 Solid, 155 yards/142 m (1 skein)
- D 29 Solid, 155 yards/142 m (1 skein)

HOOK: US J/10 6mm Tunisian crochet hook – choose either a straight hook or an interchangeable hook with a short cable and stopper

NOTIONS & SUPPLIES: Scissors, tapestry needle, locking stitch markers, blocking supplies, 2.5" (6.5 cm)Clover pom pom maker (or alternative)

FINISHED DIMENSIONS

SIZE: 9" (23 cm) wide, 75" (190 cm) long

GAUGE: 4" x 4" (10 x 10 cm) = 17 sts x 12 rows before blocking

ABBREVIATIONS

ch	chain	st	stitch
lp(s)	loop(s)	Tks	Tunisian knit stitch
lts	Last Tunisian Stitch	Tps	Tunisian purl stitch
RetP	Return Pass		

PATTERN DIRECTIONS

NOTE

• Do not fasten off any colors until instructed in the pattern.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Last Tunisian Stitch (Lts): insert hook under BOTH vertical bars of the last stitch and complete as for Tunisian simple stitch.

Return Pass (RetP): ch 1, (yarn over, pull through the next 2 loops on hook) until only one loop remains on the hook.

TECHNIQUES

Color Change at a Purl: Sections B and E involve changing color at a purl stitch, which can be a little tricky. Work the purl in the current color until it's time to yarn over and pull up the final loop. Drop the old color, yarn over with the new color, and pull up the loop. DO NOT fasten off the old color. For a closer look at mid-row Tunisian crochet color changes, check out this video tutorial – LINK.

SECTION A

ROW 1: With A, ch 32, starting with the 2nd ch from the hook, pull up a lp in the back bump of each ch across row, RetP. (32 sts)

ROWS 2-37: (Tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP.

SECTION B

ROWS 1-36: Continuing with A, (tks 1, tps 1) for 14 sts (15 lps on hook), tks 1, tps 1 and change to B, drop A, (tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP and maintain the color change.

ROW 37: Repeat previous row. At end of row, change to B, fasten off A.

SECTION C

ROWS 1-37: Continuing with B, (tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP. Change to color C at end of Row 37. Fasten off B.

SECTION D

ROWS 1-36: With C, (tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP.

ROW 37: Repeat previous row. At end of row, change to D. Fasten off C.

SECTION E

ROWS 1-36: Continuing with D, (tks 1, tps 1) for 14 sts (15 loops on hook), tks 1, tps 1 and change to C, drop D, (tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP and maintain the color change.

ROW 37: Repeat previous row. At end of row, fasten off C. Continue with D.

SECTION F

ROWS 1-37: With D, (tks 1, tps 1) to last st, Lts, RetP.

BIND OFF ROW: Continue in stitch pattern with D. After pulling up the final loop of each stitch, pull through the remaining loop on the hook to complete the slip stitch. Fasten off.

ASSEMBLY & FINISHING

- Weave in all ends.
- Steam block to final dimensions.
- Using the leftover yarn, make two 2.5" (6.5 cm) pom poms with all 4 colors [TUTORIAL]. I used the Clover green pom pom maker, but you can use a similarly sized alternative, or another size altogether.
- Using like colors, thread the pom pom onto the tips of the scarf. Pull the thread to gather the scarf, tie the ends and weave them into the wrong side of the scarf.



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
