MATERIALS

Unicorn solid

1 (1) 2 (2) 2 (2) 2 (2) hank(s) col. Green Tea (26)

Friends Kid Silk

2 (2) 3 (3) 3 (3) 4 (4) skeins col. Misty Green (113)

Circular needles 3 mm, 4 mm, 60 and 80 cm (magic loop)
Stitch markers
Stitch wire
6 (6) 6 (7) 7 (8) 9 (9) buttons, 15 mm
Yarn needle

YARN QUALITY

Unicorn Solid, Hobbii 75% merino wool, 25% polyamid 100 g = 400 m

Friends Kid Silk, hobbii 72% mohair, 25% silk, 3% wool 25 g = 200 m

GAUGE

10x10 cm / 4x4 inches = 15 sts x 22 r on 4 mm needles

ABBREVIATIONS

K = knit

P = purl

St(s) = stitch(es)

Yo = yarn over

BR = brioche

SM = stitch marker

Rnd(s) = round(s)

SIZE

9-12 months (1-2 years) 2-3 years (3-4 years) 4-5 years (5-6 years) 6-8 years (8-10 years)

MEASUREMENTS

Length: 29 (31) 33 (35) 41 (43) 45 (47) cm / 11.4 (12.2) 13 (13.75) 16.1 (17) 17.7 (18.5) inches

Bust circumference: 60 (64) 66 (72) 76 (80) 83 (86) cm / 23.6 (25.2) 26 (28.3) 30 (31.5) 32.7 (33.9) inches

PATTERN INFORMATION

Abros cardigan is worked from top to bottom in Brioche. The neck ribbing is worked on 3 mm needles, the rest of the jacket is worked on 4 mm needles. Increases are done every 8th round, by 16 sts every time to fit with the Brioche pattern. The yoke and the body is worked back and forth, while the sleeves are worked in rounds on double pointed needles, or using magic loop. The cardigan is just as good for everyday wear as it is for parties.

INFO AND TIPS

About Brioche back and forth (used for the yoke and body)

1st row (right side): *k BR-st, yo, slip st purlwise*, repeat until the end of the row. 2nd row (wrong side): *yo, slip st purlwise, k BR-st*, repeat until the end of the row. Video **here**

About Brioche - knitted in the round (used for the sleeves)

1st round: * yo, slip st purlwise, k BR-st* repeat until the end of the round. 2nd round: *p BR-st, yo, slip st purlwise* repeat until the end of the round. Video here

The BR-sts are worked by knitting or purling the yo and the st together, k or p depending on which row you're working on.

Raglan increases in Brioche

An increase in Brioche is worked from the right side in an BR-st (i.e. a st with an attached yo). When working increases in Brioche, you always increase by 2 sts, to not break the pattern.

You therefore increase 16 sts for each raglan increase. You work the increases in the k st before/after the 3 raglan sts, 2 sts on each side.

Knit the BR-st without sliding it off the left needle, yo, work the same st knitwise and slip the st off the left needle as usual, On the next rnd you work the new sts into the pattern. Video here

Double knit and Italian bind-off

1st rnd *k1, slip the st purlwise with the yarn in front of the work* repeat from *to* until the end of the rnd.

2nd rnd *slip 1 st knitwise with the yarn behind the work, p1* repeat from *to* until the end of the rnd.

If you work in double knit back and forth, just work the 1st rnd back and forth.

YOKE

Cast on 59 (61) 63 (65) 67 (71) 71 (71) sts on 3 mm needles, work 10 rows rib (k1, p1). The first and last st is an edge st, these are always worked knitwise. You are now on the right side.



Read the entire section before you begin.

(Note, the first and last st before/after the sm should be a k st, on the right side) Change to 4 mm needles

Establish your Brioche pattern with the 1st row described under "**About Brioche back and forth**" while dividing for raglan as follows:

work 9 (9) 7 (9) 9 (10) 10 (10) sts (front piece), 1 sm, work 3 sts, 1 sm, 7 (7) 9 (9) 9 (9) 9 (9) sts (sleeve), 1 sm, work 3 sts, 1 sm, 17 (17) 17 (17) 19 (21) 21 (21) sts (back piece), 1 sm, work 3 sts, 1 sm, 7 (7) 9 (9) 9 (9) 9 (9) sts (sleeve), 1 sm, work 3 sts, 1 sm, 7 (9) 9 (9) 9 (10) 10 (10) sts (front piece).

You will now start with raglan increases on every 8th row (see the explanation on how to increase in Brioche at the beginning of the pattern) a total of 5 (5) 6 (7) 7 (8) 8 (8) times.

You now have 139 (141) 159 (177) 179 (199) 199 (199) sts on your needles. Work 4 (8) 4 (8) 4 (4) 8 (8) rows in Brioche.

Work 22 (22) 22 (26) 26 (28) 28 (28) sts in Brioche, place 27 (27) 33 (37) 37 (41) 41 (41) sts on a piece of scrap yarn, cast on 1 (3) 1 (1) 3 (1) 3 (5) st(s) using loop cast on, work 43 (43) 47 (51) 53 (59) 59 (59) sts in Brioche, place 27 (27) 33 (37) 37 (41) 41 (41) sts on a piece of scrap yarn, cast on 1 (3) 1 (1) 3 (1) 3 (5) sts using loop cast on, work 20 (22) 24 (26) 26 (29) 29 (29) sts.

The body now has 87 (93) 95 (105) 111 (118) 122 (126) sts. Work back and forth in Brioche until the work measures 26 (28) 30 (32) 38 (40) 42 (44) cm from the cast-on edge, or desired length. Feel free to try it on as you go. With smaller needle work 3 cm rib (k1, p1). Bind off, preferably with 2 rows in double knit and Italian bind-off.

SLEEVES

Place the resting 27 (27) 33 (37) 37 (41) 41 (41) sts on 4 mm needles, pick up 1 (3) 1 (1) 3 (1) 3 (5) st(s) under the sleeve = 28 (30) 34 (38) 40 (42) 44 (46) sts. Work in rnds in Brioche until the sleeve measures 19 (20) 21 (22) 24 (26) 28 (30) cm, or desired length. Feel free to try it on as you go. On the next rnd, decrease by 4 (4) 4 (4) 6 (6) 6 (6) sts = 24 (26) 30 (34) 34 (36) 38 (40) sts. With smaller needle work in rib (k1, p1) for 3 cm, bind off, preferably with 2 rnds in double knit and Italian bind-off.

RIGHT BUTTON PLACKET

Using a 4 mm needle, pick up one st in each st along the edge, work in rib (k1, p1) back and forth for 5 rows, bind off.

LEFT BUTTON PLACKET

Work like for the right button placket, but on the 3rd row, make 6 (6) 6 (7) 7 (8) 9 (9) buttonholes evenly placed by knitting 2 sts together, 1 yo.

ASSEMBLY

Sew on the buttons and weave in all loose ends.
