## YARN QUALITY

## (5) Amigo Chunky, Hobbii

100 \% Acrylic
$100 \mathrm{~g}=100 \mathrm{~m}$

## GAUGE

1 tile measures $15 \times 16 \mathrm{~cm}$ ( $5.9^{\prime \prime} \times 6.3^{\prime \prime}$ )

## ABBREVIATIONS

ch = chain
ss = slip stitch
sc = single crochet
dc = double crochet
st(s) = stitch(es)
R = row/round

## SIZE

One size

## MEASUREMENTS

Width: $66 \mathrm{~cm} / 6^{\prime \prime}$

The "Soft Squares" throw is a delight to make! Just work 24 padded tiles in different colours and sew them together, finally add a border in single crochet (optional), and that's it - the final result is super soft and stunning.

## INFO AND TIPS

The throw is made of 24 padded tiles; each tile is made of 2 identical panels worked in Suzette Stitch, sewn together and padded with filling material "as-you-go". The tiles are arranged in a 4 x 6 order. Each tile is sewn to the other with a single crochet sewing method, but you can choose the method you prefer for joining. You should be able to make 2 full tiles with each skein of yarn. With the yarn leftovers I made the final border in single crochet, but this is optional. If you want to follow the exact same colour order of my throw, please refer to Photo $A$ below.

## TILES (same for all)

## $1{ }^{\text {st }}$ PANEL

Ch14.
R1. 13 sc. Ch1, turn.
R2-10. Work in Suzette Stitch. Ch1 and turn at the end of each row.

- How to work in Suzette Stitch: work *1sc+1dc in same st, skip next st. Repeat * till end of row. Finish with a sc in last st. Ch1, turn and repeat (see video tutorial for reference).

R11. 13 sc .
Secure and cut off yarn.

## $2^{\text {nd }}$ PANEL

Just like the $1^{\text {st }}$ PANEL, but do not cut off yarn at the end.

Align $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ panels with the Right Sides facing out and begin joining them together along their perimeter, with the yarn of $2^{\text {nd }}$ panel. Make sure both panels are well aligned and space sts regularly (Photo 1).

Before sewing the panels closed, do not forget to insert the filling material. To obtain my degree of "plumpness", insert 6 handfuls of filling material into each tile (Photo 2).

You now have two choices:

1. You can make all of 24 tiles one by one and sew them all together at the end. Or
2. You can join, fill and sew the tiles together "as-you-go".

If you choose method $n^{\circ} 2$, this is how you should proceed:

- All tiles of Row1: join both panels of a tile with sc, leaving one side open (Photo 4); insert filling material, then close last side of tile with sc.

- $\quad 1^{\text {st }}$ tile of Row2: same procedure as above, fill tile, then close AND join tile to matching tile of Row1 at the same time.
- All other tiles: join 2 SIDES with sc, one to the matching tile of previous row, one to the tile on same row.


## SINGLE CROCHET JOIN "AS-YOU-GO"

With the tiles' sides matching and the working yarn hanging in-between, insert hook in the corner of your current tile (TILE A, yellow) and - FROM FRONT TO BACK - in the corner of the corresponding tile (TILE B, blue), and ss (Photos 5 and 6 - please note these photos are screenshots of the video tutorial where I am using generic tiles). Then insert hook in the following st of TILE A (Photo 6), yarn over (Photo 7) and pull through, as if for a single crochet: you have 2 loops on the hook (Photo 8). Now insert hook in the corresponding st in TILE B (always from front to back and with the working yarn hanging between both tiles - Photo 9), yarn over and complete the sc, pulling through the st of TILE B and both loops of TILE A (Photos 10 and 11).

Proceed working each joining sc on both tiles as just described, spacing out sts regularly.

Join all of 24 padded tiles together as described, following the colour order shown in Photo $A$ (of course you can change this order, if you like), in rows of 4 tiles times 6 . Cut off yarn when you change colour and hide yarn ends inside each tile before closing them, so you do not have to do any weaving-in at the end of the project.

## FINISHING (optional)

If you like, you can add a decorative border in single crochet that goes all around the blanket, using up all yarn leftovers. Proceed as follows: at the end of last tile, do not cut off yarn, but insert hook in the last worked st, yarn over and pull through, then ch1 and sc in same st. Now work in sc around, spacing out sts regularly and working *1sc, ch2, 1sc at corners. Whenever a colour ends, just attach another one, following the order you prefer. At the end of a round, ss into beginning st of round, then ch1, sc in same st, and proceed on working in sc around. Make as many rounds as you like and can (I managed to make almost 3). At the end of the last working yarn-leftover, make 2 ss into the following 2 sts (regardless whether you have finished the round or not), then fasten off. Done!
