Birch

Beanie

MATERIALS

Divina

A: 1 skein of color 3
B: 1 skein of color 9
C: 1 skein of color 4

Crochet hook 5 mm / US 8/H
Tapestry needle

YARN QUALITY

 **Divina**, Hobbii
65% Alpaca, 28% Polyamide, 7% Wool
50 g (1.75 oz) = 150 m (164 yds)

GAUGE

Used for the main body:
moss, alpine and puff
14 sts x 13 rows = 10 cm x 10 cm / 4" x 4"

Used for the ribbing, sl sts:
15 sts x 17 rows = 7 cm x 10 cm / 2,76" x 4"

ABBREVIATIONS

ch = chain
sl st = slip stitch
sts = stitches
sc = single crochet
hdc = half double crochet
dc = double crochet
ps = puff stitch
blo = back loop only
fp = front post
bp = back post

SIZE

Adult S, M, L

MEASUREMENTS

To fit head circumference:
53-56, 56-58.5, 58.5-61 cm /
21-22, 22-23, 23-24 inches

Wear this beanie with a fit that is 7.5 cm / 3 inches smaller than your actual measurements. Keep in mind to stretch the ribbing while wearing, as the fabric is highly stretchable and will naturally loosen over time.

PATTERN INFORMATION

Introducing the "Birch" Crochet Beanie, a nature-inspired creation inspired by the hues and texture of birch trees. Ideal for intermediate-level crocheters with a grasp of basic construction techniques.

The main feature of the "Birch" beanie is the texture achieved through a blend of moss stitches, alpine stitches, and puff stitches. These stitches capture the essence of birch tree bark, adding depth to your finished piece. Check out the palette and unique texture of the "Birch" beanie, and start a creative journey that reflects the timeless beauty of nature.

INFO AND TIPS

In this pattern we will be alternating between moss stitches, alpine/ribbing stitches and puff stitches.

Moss Stitch

To make a moss stitch you'll need to alternate between single crochet and chain stitches in each row.

Alpine/Ribbing Stitch

In this pattern we're introducing a new stitch, the end result looks similar to the traditional alpine stitch but adds more texture to the fabric. Start by doing one row of dc crochet stitches and one row of (dc fp, dc bp).

Puff Stitch

To make a puff stitch in this pattern you'll need to Yarn over, insert the hook into the designated stitch, and pull up a loop (you should have 3 loops on the hook). Then, yarn over and insert the hook back into the same stitch, pull up another loop (5 loops on the hook). Repeat this process one more time in the same stitch until you have 7 loops on your hook. Yarn over and pull through all the loops on the hook, then chain 1 to secure the puff stitch.





MAIN BODY

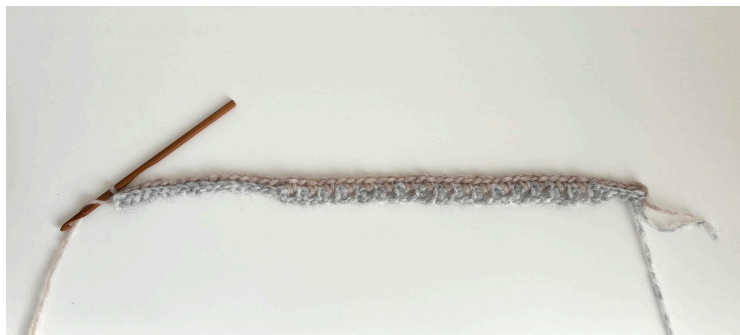
Crochet in rows using three different colors A, B and C. Alternate the colors in this specific order for each row.

Make a 56 ch foundation chain.

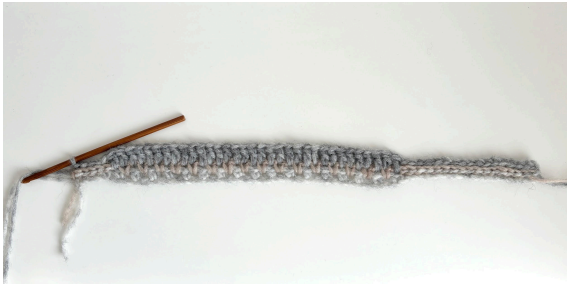
Row 1: Starting from the second ch from the hook, sl st 17. Repeat (sc, ch 1, skip 1 st) in the next 33 sts, sl st 5, turn



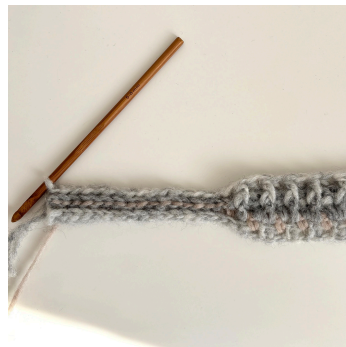
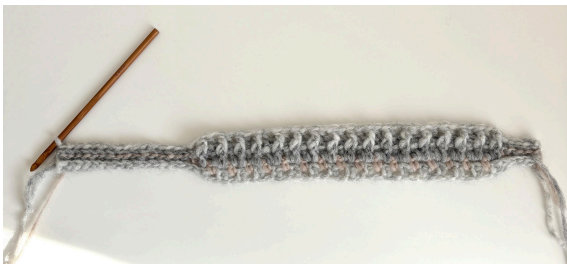
Row 2: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 5, repeat (ch 1, skip 1 st, sc) in the next 33 sts, blo sl st 17, turn



Row 3: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 17, dc in the next 33 sts, blo sl st 5, turn



Row 4: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 5, (dc fp, dc bp) in the next 33 sts, blo sl st 17, turn

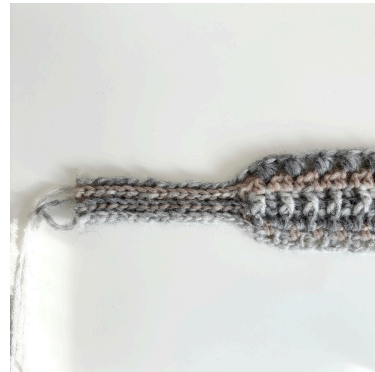
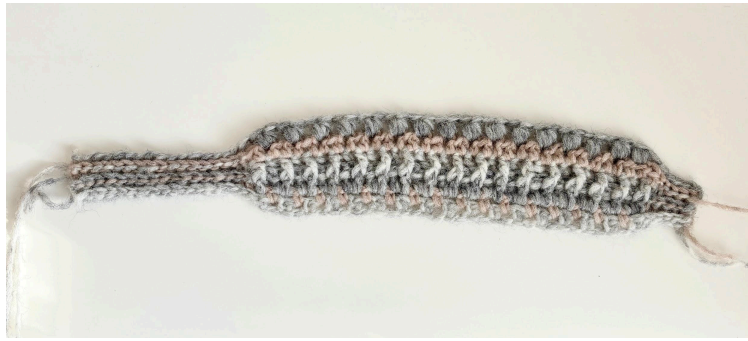


Row 5: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 17, hdc in the next 33 sts, blo sl st 5, turn



Row 6: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 5, (skip one st, ps) in the next 33 sts***, blo sl st 17, turn

***Note: You might have to crochet a ps in the 32nd st and skip the 33rd stitch



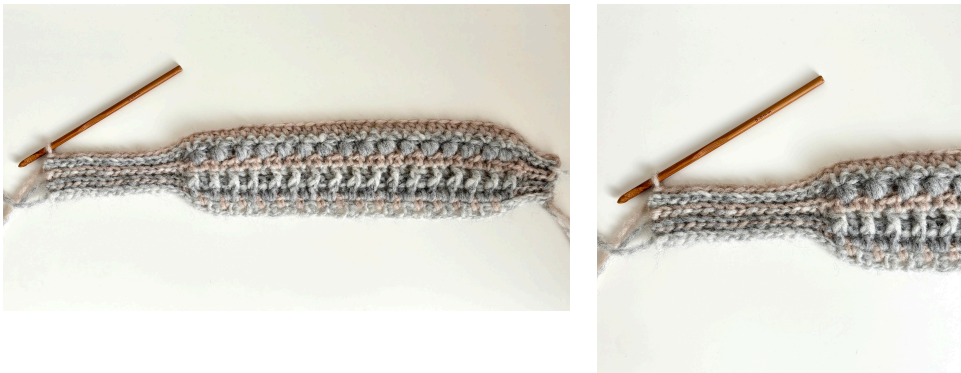
Now in the next row we will do something fun that will make our puff stitches stand out even more: double crochet in between puff stitches (in the hdc row) and single crochet on top of them!

Row 7: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 17, (dc on the stitch we skipped on the previous row, sc on top of the ps) in the next 33 sts, blo sl st 5, turn





Row 8: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 5, hdc 33, blo sl st 17, turn



Now we are going to repeat rows 1 - 8

- 6 more times for a **small fit**
- 7 times for a **medium fit**
- 8 times for a **large fit**

Before you start, let's change the first row. This is the row we will be repeating in the next steps:

Row 1: Ch 1 (turning ch does not count as a st), blo sl st 17, (sc, ch 1, skip 1 st) in the next 33 sts, sl st 5, turn

Weave in all your yarn ends.

Note: it might feel like a tight fit at first but remember this fabric is super stretchy and will continue stretching with time. Do not be afraid to add more rows to fit your head circumference.

ASSEMBLY

Place your project on a flat surface, fold it in half as shown in the pictures, and then use slip stitch to join both sides together.



To finish your crochet beanie's top, take a piece of yarn and thread it through a tapestry needle. Insert the needle through the stitches at the top of the hat, where we made a ribbing with 5 slip stitches, and pull it tight to close the opening. Tie the yarn securely with a knot and tuck in the loose ends.

Fold the ribbing of your beanie upwards. This creates a neat and doubled-up edge, giving your beanie a stylish finish. Adjust the fold to your preferred height, and you're done!
